We are introducing the optimal renewable energy systems for the village energy demands, and are using an energy management system and storage batteries to adjust supply and demand, in order to introduce systems that are economical and sustainable.

Okuma Town: Working to achieve the Zero Carbon Vision

2040年までのゼロカーボン達成を目標として掲げ、将来、「原発事故が あった町」ではなく「ゼロカーボンタウンの先進地」として語れるまちづくり を目指します。

We have set the target of achieving zero carbon emissions by 2040, aiming for town development which in the future will make Okuma Town known as "a leading zero carbon town" instead of "a town that suffered from the nuclear accident".
